▲ Storing Your MGA for Winter▲

Ask a dozen MGA owners how each of them store their car over the winter and you will receive a dozen different answers. However, John Twist wrote an excellent article in the September/October, 2006 edition of MGA! Magazine of how to store your MGA for the Winter. Following is a synopsis of that article. If you want to get the skinny right from the horse's mouth, I suggest you dust off your old copy of MGA! Magazine and read his every word.

- Take your car on a half-hour run to evaporate all of the moisture in the exhaust and engine.
- Position your car on a large piece of plastic sheeting to protect the underside of your car from moisture rising up through the concrete.
- Block your car in place and leave the handbrake off.
- Install a 50/50 solution of antifreeze and water to prevent the coolant from freezing in the engine block
- Install fresh oil to bearing etching, caused by dirty, acidic, contaminated oil.
- Top of your fuel tank and add Stabill or similar product to reduce the amount of water that can be absorbed by the gasoline and slot the rate at which the gasoline turns to varnish.
- Top off the master cylinders to reduce water contamination in the hydraulic lines.
- Discharge a whole can of WD-40 on all engine components, especially the bright metal or aluminum parts and the wheels to protect them from oxidation. This sounds good and I understand the principle, but there is no way that I would want to clean it all off in the spring before the first car show. Maybe this is good advice for those who have to store their car outside.)
- Remove the battery to prevent freezing. Should the battery freeze and burst, sulfuric acid will cover everything around the battery area.
- Store with your top up to prevent nasty creases that can develop in your top.
- Install side curtains to make it more difficult for small furry creatures to foul or devour interiors.
- Put duct tape over tailpipe outlet to prevent moisture (and rodents) from entering the exhaust system.
- If you cover your car, use cloth, never plastic.
- If stored on jack stands, place stands under the outer portion of the front A arms and under the leaf springs where the U bolts surround the axle and spring. This keeps the suspension from dropping away from the body and straining the shocks and the rebound rubbers/straps. Reduce tire pressure to 10-15 pounds if you store of jack stands. Whether you store on jack stands or on the ground, be certain to move the wheels a couple of tires during storage. Several rotations work well to prevent the bearings from rusting and, if stored on the ground, will prevent flat spots from developing on the tires.
- Rolling the car back and forth prevents the brake pads from rusting to the rotors (just as the clutch disc and rust to the flywheel). Operate the brakes on a regular basis to prevent the cylinders from freezing because of rust. Some owners back off the adjustment on the brake drums so there is no chance of the shoes rusting to the drums this also allows the cylinders to more farther while exercising the pedal. Exercise the handbrake, too, by rapidly moving the handle up and down to keep the cable and linkages from rusting.
- If the battery is stored in freezing temperatures then is should not be allowed to loose its charge. If the battery charge is reduced far enough, the electrolyte freezes, the case cracks, and the battery is ruined. Use of a "trickle charger" or battery monitor will accomplish this task with ease.
- Low winter humidity dries leather seats, allowing them to contract and crack. Prepare the leather with Lexol or similar product to keep them supple.

• Mice cause the greatest damage to interiors. They eat seats, carpeting, and wiring insulation – they eat everything. Several dishes of naphthalene mothballs, in the foot wells, in the trunk and engine compartment repel most mice.

Although after you have done all the above, you will wish that you lived in an area where you could drive you car all year round.
